#### Safeguarding

In addition to this, we are launching our Mental Health and Well-Being strategy which we have been planning this term in partnership with Oxford Health. It will see us developing and expanding the Pastoral Team and helping our young people to develop their awareness of their well-being, mindfulness and resilience.

### **Chaplaincy articles:**

On 4th December fourteen of our Y8 and Y9 pupils visited St Edwards Independent School in Romsey where they have been involved in the afforestation project work that we set up for them last year. Steve Wheelan, Head of RE welcomed us at the school where he explained to the pupils the project itself and gave every pupil a pack, which explained all the necessary details. After the introduction to the project we went to their back meadow where we carried on planting nearly 100 trees as a follow up from their own pupils' involvement earlier. After speaking to the pupils, they all seemed to like the experience and would be interested to do the tree planting again. The idea behind the project is that once our pupils were trained how to be involved successfully in the afforestation project, they would be able to teach others in our school to do the same around the grounds of St Joseph's as well, which would help to improve our environment and contribute positively towards net zero emissions goals, which we still fall well short as a country at this stage.

The chaplaincy team prepared and delivered an assembly based around Service and Vocations. Their inspiration came from Diocesan Vocation Roadshow organised at the end of last academic year and the current chaplains explained how to serve as they understood it in our community. They have visited St Osmund's Primary school on several occasions where they helped with Art and Reading in Years 1 and 2. They had been praised for their excellent work by Mr Sanderson, who was delighted with their good work with the pupils in St Osmund's. The current Chaplaincy team invited new potential members for a meeting last week and we have already had a few showing interest, which is good news for the Chaplaincy work ahead of us. ### Show my Homework: Feedback, updates and logging-in.

We introduced this system of recording and sharing homework with students and parents over a year ago and we are keen to get some feedback.

Our aims were as follows:

- To allow users to know what homework was set and when it is due
- To provide resources and/or links to websites or learning platforms, such as GCSEpod, to help with homework tasks We did this because feedback at parents' evenings was suggesting that it was not always clear what was required. This may have been because homework was not properly recorded in planners and/or because worksheets and resources had been lost.

By introducing the service we hope that parents and students can see exactly what needs to be done, by when and for which subject or teacher.

We hope that this has made the conversations about homework easier, less stressful and in time will allow our pupils to learn to take control of their learning, organising their time effectively, using the system's 'easy to view' task organiser.

In the New Year we will ask for your feedback but in the meantime, if you wish to share any comments about how the system is working for you, please use the email admin@sjcs.org.uk. I am delighted to be able to feedback that Team Satchel have listened to requests to provide even greater control over parental notifications. If you do not wish to be informed about tasks set or due dates, there are silent periods pre-set to avoid unnecessary intrusion or you can

simply turn these off – something you could not do before and something school had no control over either.

If you need to have your parental login details reissued, do contact admin@sjcs.org.uk – you can see for yourself what is expected to be done and by when and this may help avoid detentions for incomplete work set.

Finally, if your child is having difficulty logging in there are 2 options:

- 1. contact Team Satchel directly
- 2. Or contact school who will reset using their school email address as the username and then a 10 character password (this has to include a capital letter, a number and a special character, such as !)

#### **Assemblies**

Since September, we have been using our Corridor of Values to theme our weekly assemblies. These are based on Matthew's Gospel and Jesus' teachings about respect, tolerance, dignity, service, faithfulness, integrity, holiness, to name a few.

We would all recognise these values as being at the heart of who we would hope our young people are growing up to become. We believe that with these values being explored in assemblies, our pupils are able to recognise the goodness in each other and the importance of these for when they take their place in the world when they leave us.

We have introduced certificates to recognise the students in each tutor group who have best shown these values and pupils have been nominated by their form tutors for these awards. This will continue into the new term.

#### **Student Voice**

From January 2020 we are expanding our student councils. In addition to the Pupil Parliament, there will be new opportunities for students to learn about democracy (having a say and listening to others), plan for events, problem solve and communicate their actions to the wider school community.

We have already set up an Environmental Council and students are working on trying to get sponsorship for redeveloping school space.

Our next opportunity to get involved will be our Well-Being Council which will look at how we are an inclusive school that celebrates the rights and dignity of every individual; how we can develop mentoring; our approaches to being a place where pupils know how to be safe and what to do when this may be challenged.

Future councils, such as Arts, Sports and Community are being planned – in this way we hope that at any one time, there will be a wider number of students who can develop their leadership skills.



### Odd Socks & Antibullying

In November we joined a large proportion of the country with assemblies and activities based around anti-bullying week. Pupils were encouraged to reflect on the roles in bullying, how those are often fluid and how we all at some point may contribute to someone else not feeling positive. With a theme of 'Change Starts With Us' a large number of staff and pupils donned their odd socks on the Friday to show solidarity for each other, the messages they had received and the knowledge that we all had a role to play in preventing and stopping bullying.









# History HA Group - Look Again Project

The History HA group have continued to be involved in the Look Again project at Salisbury Museum. They have been working as a collective with other school groups to redesign the Fashion Gallery at the museum.

This term students have been creating drawings of some of the fashion accessories from the museum archives which are to be included in the redesigned gallery. They got to view and handle a variety of artefacts including shoes, jewellery, belts and buckles, some of which were over a hundred years old.

Next term students will be collaborating with Bexi Harris, a graphic designer from Unstuck Design who will help them to make their drawings into display panels for the new gallery.

The History HA group are looking forward to seeing their designs in the new gallery and excited to think that their work will be informing future generations who visit the Fashion Gallery at Salisbury Museum.

### Institution of Mechanical Engineers (IMechE)

Arnold Barks School Lecture held at Bishop Wordsworth School – 11 December 2019 Behind the wheel with "The Stig" from F1 to Top Gear

"Some say he naturally faces magnetic north, and that all of his legs are hydraulic.... All we know is, he's call the Stig." Jeremy Clarkson, Top Gear Season 6, Episode 6 Year 10 and 11 pupils were invited to BWS on Wednesday 11th December to listen to a talk by Perry McCarthy, the original Stig! Perry provided a first-hand account of what it means to be a racing driver, including his time racing everything up to F1 and then testing the world's fastest production cars as "The Stig" on the BBC's Top Gear show.

Perry was inspirational and enthused pupils about STEM topics. He told of his aspirations to make it to the top, including working on the oil rigs to save enough money to fulfil his ambition. There were lots of question and answer opportunities during the talk for which St Joseph's pupils took full advantage, showing their enthusiasm and knowledge.

The talk was informative, inspirational, personal, enthusiastic, funny and above all it showed the pupils that anything was possible if you had a dream to make it! It was a fantastic talk!
