Candle Conference



In November 2017 Mr Blaho–Schlogl accompanied 12 pupils from our Year 11 to the 'Candle Conference'. They had an opportunity to meet with Professor Peter Vardy, an academic and university lecturer who is a renowned Christian theologian with many years of experience of preparing pupils to excel at GCSE and A level studies. Professor Vardy delivered a set of lectures throughout the day, which dealt with the new AQA GCSE course and gave our pupils an opportunity to experience a university style of teaching and meet with other KS4 pupils from seven other secondary schools who sent their delegates to this amazing one off event. All the pupils benefited from this experience as they were given exceptionally useful tips and exam skills, which were truly targeted to master their mock exams as well as in the long term to gain extra confidence to perform well at their final GCSE examinations this summer.

Spanish Traditions

KS4 GCSE Spanish students reenacted the Spanish tradition of eating 12 grapes to welcome the New Year. Whether by habit, belief or fun, some people in Hispanic countries do a ritual to welcome in the New Year in the hope that it brings abundance, love and success for the year ahead.

One of these rituals is the widely known eating of 12 grapes. A wish is asked for each grape that is eaten; each grape also represents prosperity for each month of the year.

When it is midnight in Spain and other Hispanic countries on New Year's Eve, each time the clock chimes, all the people put a grape in their mouth. Some children eat sweets instead. By the time the clock has finished chiming for the twelfth time, everybody has to have finished their grapes and the New Year starts.

Eating the grapes is very funny because everybody starts the New Year with a full mouthful of grapes. It's almost impossible to finish eating the grapes by the time the clock finishes chiming and quite often people still have all the grapes in their mouths causing all participants to look a little silly and thus prompting laughter!







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La Pinata

Students in Spanish club made their own "Piñatas" last term. Students had a lot of fun recreating the traditional Latin American piñata and learnt the meaning and traditions surrounding this colourful star filled with delicious treats.

Symbolism of the piñata:

• The seven peaks symbolize the seven deadly sins: gluttony, greed, arrogance, lust, laziness, anger and envy.

- Bright colours mean the temptation of evil.
- Fruit and sweets mean the grace of God.
- The stick is the struggle of man against temptation.
- The bandage means faith in God.
- Breaking the piñata means the destruction of evil.
