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Science Week

This year we saw another successful week of activities at St. Joseph's from Monday 13th to the 17th March. Over 30 year 8 pupils started off the week with a dissection of an eyeball during their lunchtime. There were squirms and screams as the eyeball was popped and the jelly inside oozed out. Some pupils found a lens and magnified the newspaper print. Later in the week a small group of year 9 pupils carried out a dissection of a pig's trotter. They were able to identify tendons, ligaments and cartilage and got a real insight into how to move the trotter in all sorts of directions.

The week culminated in our Year 7 Diorama competition where pupils had been asked to design their own project in a shoe-box for homework over a month. Mrs. Shuttleworth and Mr. Rooney judged the competition and all staff commented on the high standard of work the pupils had made. Pupils from all year groups came and looked at the projects and there was a pupil vote too. Thanks to the parents who came after school too to look at the amazing work the year 7s had produced.
