
Salisbury Schools' Book Awards: A Morning with Kirsty Applebaum – 30th March 2022



Every year, several schools in the Salisbury area work together to run the Salisbury Schools' Book Awards. Librarians from each of the schools shortlist a total of six books, and a group of pupils from each school reads them all and votes for their favourite. The schools then take it in turns to host a special event to announce the winner of this year's award.

This year, we had the pleasure of hosting the awards here at St Joseph's, led by Miss Clark and Mrs Fenwick. We hosted a special event to announce the winner with the most votes from readers (which this year was Truly Devious by Maureen Johnson), and we were excited to be able to organise an in-person visit from one of our shortlisted authors, Kirsty Applebaum.

Kirsty gave an inspiring talk to our Year 7 pupils in the hall, plus groups of pupils and librarians who visited from the other participating schools (Godolphin, Trafalgar, SWGS, Sarum Academy, and Bishop Wordsworth's – WSE also took part but were unfortunately unable to attend).

Kirsty talked about how her childhood inspired her books and how she came up with the idea for her book *Troofriend*. She then worked with the pupils to create a collaborative sci-fi story. She told them about the "where, what, when, where, why, how" framework that can be used to generate ideas for stories and used this to gather ideas from the pupils. It was great to see everyone really engaging with this activity and sharing their ideas.

After the talk, Kirsty worked with our Year 7 English HA class to deliver a special writing workshop. The pupils created a new character following a series of prompts from Kirsty, and then used the same framework from the talk to develop a story around their characters. The ideas they came up with in just 30 minutes were incredible - we definitely have some talented budding authors!

Thank you to Kirsty Applebaum for making it a memorable day for us, our pupils, and the other visiting schools. We also appreciated the support we had from other St Joseph's staff, especially the English department – their support helped to make the whole morning run smoothly.
